OVERVIEW

Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (JROTC) programs are administered by the Department of Defense and the service branch represented.

Programs are available to students across the state in the Navy, Army, Air Force, and Marines to assist them with the transition to college, a military career, and(/or) the workforce.



BENEFITS OF JROTC

- JROTC is a high school program of instruction designed to teach citizenship and leadership, while installing self-esteem, teamwork, and self-discipline.
- JROTC provides a national curriculum that is used by all branches so it will prepare them for postsecondary JROTC programs at the college level or entry into the military.
- JROTC provides highly successful students the opportunity of possibly being chosen to attend one of the military academies via scholarship.
- JROTC provides cadets, who choose to enlist or enter Senior ROTC, with benefits through higher rank or advancement.
- JROTC's main national goal is to have students graduate from high school, attend institutions of higher learning, and pursue meaningful careers particularly in the areas of science, technology, engineering, and mathematics.
- JROTC provides a quality citizenship, character, and leadership development program, while fostering partnerships with communities and educational institutions.
- JROTC emphasizes citizenship and leadership development. Prepares them for success after school.
- JROTC conducts competitions in Drill, Raider Challenge, Riflery, JROTC Academic Bowl and Leadership Challenge (national).

- JROTC students can earn the required Health/PE credits through 3 JROTC courses if system permits.


JROTC CEDAR SHOALS






SFC (R) KENNETH L. WASHINGTON JR.

LIEUTENANT COLONEL DAVID MCMICKLE

Lieutenant Colonel David McMickle graduated as a distinguished military graduate from North Georgia College in 1987 with a Baccalaureate Degree in Criminal Justice. He earned a Master's Degree in Human Resources from Troy University in 1996 and a Master's Degree in Security Management from Webster University in 2006.



Lieutenant Colonel McMickle has held numerous command and staff positions throughout his military career. After completing Flight School and the AH-1 Qualification Course at Fort Rucker, Alabama, he was assigned as the Aero Weapons Platoon Leader for Bravo Troop, 2/17th Cavalry Squadron, Fort Campbell, Kentucky. In August 1990, he and his troop deployed as part of the Division Ready Brigade (DRB) for Operations Desert Shield and Storm. He later served as the Assistant Squadron Operations Officer, S3, for the 2/17th Cavalry Squadron. In 1992, Lieutenant Colonel McMickle was assigned as the Assistant Brigade Operations Officer, S3, for the 6th Infantry's Division Aviation Brigade at Fort Wainwright, Alaska. In 1993, he assumed command of Headquarters and Headquarters Troop, 4-9 Cavalry Squadron, Fort Wainwright, Alaska. After the de-activation of the 6th Infantry Division, Lieutenant Colonel McMickle was assigned as an Assistant Operations Officer, S3, to the 18th Aviation Brigade, and later as the Adjutant, S1, to the 229th Attack Helicopter Regiment, at Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

After a permanent change of station to Fort Rucker, Alabama, he assumed command of Alpha Company, 1-11th Aviation Regiment, at Fort Rucker, Alabama. Lieutenant Colonel McMickle later served as the Operations Officer, S3, for the 1-11th Aviation Regiment. In 1999, he was assigned as the Ground Liaison Officer (GLO) for the United States Air Force 8th Fighter Wing, Kunsan Airbase, Korea. Upon returning to the states in 2000, Lieutenant Colonel McMickle was assigned as the 18th Aviation Brigade Adjutant, S1, at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. He later served as the Operations Officer, S3, and Executive Officer, XO, for the 1-58th Aviation Regiment at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Lieutenant Colonel McMickle deployed to Afghanistan in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and to Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, while continuing to deploy the Regiment in support of the Global War on Terrorism. Lieutenant Colonel McMickle served as the Executive Officer (XO) and Professor of Military Science (PMS) for the Georgia Institute of Technology Army ROTC Battalion, in Atlanta, Georgia during the years 2003-2005. As his final active duty station, Lieutenant Colonel McMickle served as the Professor of Military Science (PMS) at Marion Military Institute in Marion, Alabama from 2005-2007. Upon retirement from the U.S. Army in 2007, Lieutenant Colonel McMickle has served the past fourteen years as the Senior Army Instructor (SAI) for the Clarke Central High School Army JROTC, Athens, Georgia.

Lieutenant Colonel McMickle's personal and unit decorations include the Bronze Star Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (4 awards), the Air Medal (2 awards), the Air Medal (2 awards), the Air Force Commendation Medal and the Joint Meritorious Unit Award. He is a Senior Army Aviator, rated in the OH-58 Kiowa, UH-1 Huey, TH-67 Creek, AH-1 Cobra and the UH-60 Blackhawk helicopters, as well as having 150 +/- hours in the F-16D. He is Airborne and Air Assault qualified.

Lieutenant Colonel McMickle is married to the former Beth McGraw and they have, between them, three sons - Brad, Chris and Josh.

SFC (R) Donald Hollman joined the Army in December of 1994 from his hometown of San Bernardino, California. Enlisting right out of high school, SFC Hollman held numerous positions during his 21 years of service. He enlisted as a 13B Artilleryman cannon crew member, where he attended Fort Sill Oklahoma for OSUT. After training he was sent to Camp Casey Korea in March 1995 where he served in the 2nd Infantry Division as a cannon crew member until March 1996. He then relocated to Fort Lewis Washington and was assigned to I Corp in a small detachment in Yakima Washington as range control.

He left the Army in December 1997 and decided to join the Marine Corps, where he enlisted as a 3112 Transportation Management Specialist. He attended Marine Corps boot camp at San Diego Marine Corps Recruit Depot (MCRD), California and was stationed at Camp Pendleton, Miramar, and MCRD San Diego, where he held the following duties: freight management, household goods supervisor, and passenger travel specialist.

He left the Marines in March 2002 and enlisted into the Army as an 88N Transportation Management Coordinator. Where he served as an Instructor/Writer for the TRADOC at the Transportation School where he taught 88N AIT, until March 2004. SFC Hollman was later sent to 6th Transportation BN,

as a movement NCO, where he worked with the 384th Movement Control Team (MCT), providing support to multiple operations ton include, joint inspections and ADACG operations with the Air force at Langley VA and JLOTS operations in Virginia Beach. He later deployed to LSA Kuwait in Oct 2004 during Operation Iraqi Freedom with the 384th MCT as Highway Regulators, monitoring all highways and convoy operations throughout the area of Kuwait.

After returning from Kuwait in Oct 2005, SFC Hollman was relocated to Fort Hood, Texas in January 2006 where he was assigned to 1st Cavalry Division, 15th Sustainment Brigade SPO as the Movements NCO. In August 2006 SFC Hollman deployed to Iraq in Support of Operations Iraqi Freedom and was extended for 3 month to help push the Iraqi surge as the SPO night shift NCOIC.

After returning in Oct 2007, SFC Hollman went into the AGR program. He's first duty assignment was with the 200th MPCOM out of Fort Meade as the G-4 Transportation Management Coordinator NCOIC, where he also served as the Platoon Sergeant for the Head Quarters. SFC Hollman later relocated to Joint Base Lewis McChord in June of 2011 and was assigned to the 382nd CSSB as the SPO NCOIC/Chief Movement Supervisor, which he also held the follow duties, First Sergeant, Billing Official, Physical Security Officer, Classified Material Courier, Mobilization NCOIC, Unit Movement NCOIC and Operations Security Officer. In 2014 SFC Hollman relocated to 311 ESC in Santa Monica California as the Staff Movement NCO, where he retired on August 1, 2015.

Upon retirement SFC Hollman moved to Georgia and was hired by WELS companies as the Warehouse Manager and later took a job with Tulite Glass Company as a production supervisor. In August 2016 SFC Hollman started a career at Clarke Central High School, Athens Georgia as an Army Instructor (AI) for the Army JROTC program.

CONNECTION BETWEEN JROTC AND CTAE

JROTC offers the opportunity for high school students to enroll in a leadership/citizenship program coordinated under the umbrella of the Career, Technical and Agricultural Education Division of the Georgia Department of Education. Any three JROTC courses satisfy the requirements for a career pathway, and the JROTC curriculum satisfies national and Georgia Performance Standards (GPS) requirements. JROTC instructors in Georgia are required to secure a Georgia teaching "Permit" through the Professional Standards Commission in addition to their military credential. Georgia has its fair share of available units/programs; however, schools/systems should apply for a program in case expansion is accelerated. A waiting list is maintained by each branch of Stational Defense Cadet Corps (NDCC) programs are also available through the Army, Air Force, and Marine Corps. NDCC programs are equal to JROTC programs except, they are 100% locally funded. JROTC in Georgia (GAJROTC) is an affiliate organization of the Association for Career and Technical Education and Georgia Association for Career and Technical Education. Federal law establishes JROTC units fairly and equitably across the United States.







- All 11 students who took the American Welding Society Certification Test successfully passed














SUMMER PROGRAMS
