Wash Your Hands!

Washing your hands is the best way to prevent the spread of colds, flu, skin infections and stomach infections.

Germs are spread by:

- Touching your mouth or eyes
- Nail biting, thumb sucking, handling food
- Shaking hands, touching toys, door knobs or other objects

When to wash your hands

Before:

- Making or eating food
- Taking care of someone who is sick or has a sore.
- Putting in or taking out contact lenses.

After:

- Using the bathroom
- o Changing a diaper or helping someone use the bathroom
- Handling food
- Touching pets
- Sneezing or blowing your nose
- Handling garbage
- o Taking care of someone who is sick or hurt.
- Playing outside.

How to wash your hands

- 1. Wet hands
- 2. Soap for 20 seconds (Sing *Happy Birthday To You* two times)
- 3. Scrub the backs of hands, wrists, between fingers, rubbing hard.
- 4. Rinse with clean water
- 5. Dry with a towel
- 6. Turn off the water using the towel.

If you don't have water and soap available, you can use a waterless hand sanitizer until you can use water.
